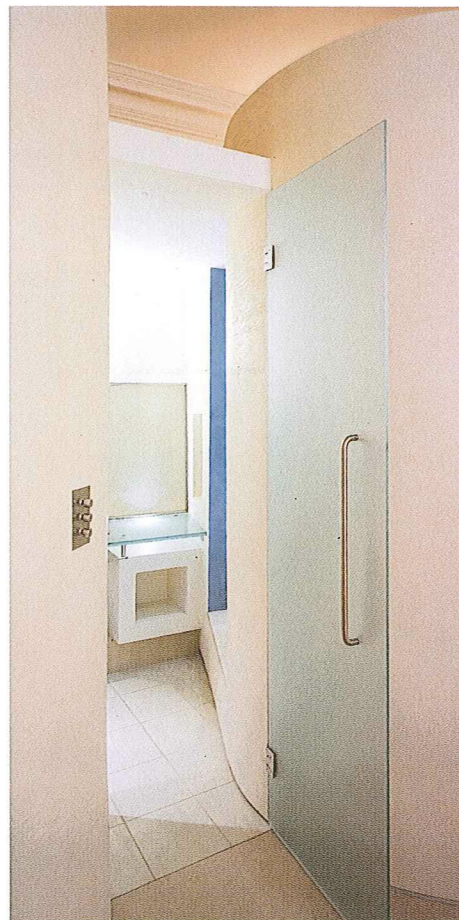




↑ Providing a neat screen between the bathroom and bedroom, this glass door sits in a sturdy sliding-track frame recessed into both the floor and the ceiling. The door is held in place by a runner situated at the top of the frame.

→ Two curved plaster pods have been built into this apartment, remodelled by architect John Kerr, to provide a bath on one side and shower with WC on the other. Between these two elements is a semi-transparent glass door with a long stainless-steel handle. The pods have been given an unusual finish in textured Venetian plaster. This exterior roughness stands in deliberate tactile contrast to the smooth, sleek, finely polished surfaces of the interiors.



← This view is of the inside the pods illustrated below (see picture 134). The glass door opens to reveal a simple interior – the wall on the right curls around to envelop a shower, and directly in front of the door is a basin set into a glass counter with storage shelving below. The lowered false ceiling adds a sense of intimacy.

→ A close-up shot reveals the elegant detailing of a sliding glass door in this project by Anelius Design. The glass panel is hung on a slender, wall-mounted, stainless-steel track. Two tiny rubber buffers are fitted on the pole support to make sure that the glass is stopped in its tracks and does not overshoot into the adjacent stainless-steel door.



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
